2015 was a historic year full of transformation and growth.

Bivona placed a permanent footprint in Monroe County through the grand opening of the agency's newly renovated, centrally located and historically preserved home — **The Skalny Building at One Mount Hope Avenue**, Rochester's oldest commercial building. With the agency's relocation to the Skalny Building, Bivona enhanced its partnerships and programs to meet the growing needs of the children and families served. Partner agencies are now fully located at Bivona and we have space to accommodate future growth.

Our expansion has also led to the enhancement of our **crisis intervention services**, including support groups for teens and parents, and **mental health counseling** provided to children and their families. Victim advocacy now includes a range of enhanced mental health resources and support groups. Through our onsite partners such as **RESTORE Sexual Assault Services**, both children and parents alike are now receiving the support they need in the time of crisis through direct counseling and victim advocacy services. RESTORE's trained counselors are available 24-hours a day, seven days a week to provide support, offer advocacy information about legal rights, provide short-term counseling sessions as well as legal and medical accompaniment. **Together we work to end the trauma of child sexual abuse.**

Profile in the Spotlight: RESTORE Sexual Assault Services

Bivona continues striving to provide comprehensive services to children and their families that will reduce trauma and foster healing. In partnership with RESTORE Sexual Assault Services (formerly Rape Crisis Services), victims of sexual assault and their families are able to receive the support needed to make informed choices concerning their medical, legal and counseling needs.

RESTORE Sexual Assault Services, a program of Planned Parenthood of Central and Western New York, provides crisis intervention and support services to women, children and men who are survivors of sexual assault. Trained counselors are available 24-hours a day, seven days a week to provide information and support, offer advocacy information about legal rights, provide short-term counseling sessions as well as legal and medical accompaniment throughout five counties: Monroe, Genesee, Livingston, Orleans and Wyoming. All of the services provided are free and confidential.

RESTORE's Program Manager, Mary Jo Marino, began her career as a Crisis Services Advocate. Her passion for counseling led her to become a therapist, advocate and supervisor for Rape Crisis Services. Throughout

her time serving the community, Mary Jo's interests led to the pursuit of her current role where she not only provides counseling and outreach but also manages and trains the staff that maintain the 24-hour crisis hotline.

How has the partnership between Bivona and RESTORE impacted the services offered to clients? Since our main offices are now located at Bivona's new home, the number of clients we service has significantly increased by 50 percent. We have been able to offer services to both parents and children and intervene at the time of crisis.

Through our partnership and new location, we now have complete access to Bivona's entire multidisciplinary team which allows us to provide better support services and care. Our clients are empowered knowing that all of Bivona's partner agencies are supporting them.

What is the key focus for the next year? Expansion! We plan to increase our service offerings within local colleges throughout our region. In addition to this effort, we will also continue adding more staff members and growing our prevention efforts to include bystander intervention and raise overall awareness.



What is one of the biggest misconceptions you face within the industry? Our society tends to believe that sexual assault is a personal issue, rather than an issue that can be prevented. Prevention includes everyone and requires education to eliminate sexual violence from occurring.

What is the best piece of advice you would give to survivors and their family members? It's never too late to get help! Regardless of whether the sexual assault occurred eight minutes ago or 58 years ago, we are here to assist you and provide you with options to empower you to regain control.

Bivona Child Abuse Summit



Nearly 625 professionals from across the country gathered together to learn the latest in child abuse investigation, evaluation and treatment at **Bivona's 7th Annual Child Abuse Summit presented by the Daisy Marquis Jones Foundation**. Attendees included social workers, law enforcement, attorneys, judges, mental health professionals, the pediatric medical community, school personnel, daycare providers, child advocacy center personnel, the faith-based community and personnel from youth service organizations.

Bivona's annual two-day conference has been nationally recognized as the premier child abuse conference in the northeast region offering cutting-edge information from national and international industry experts. Each workshop session presented included topics from the many varied disciplines that comprise the professionals that combat crimes against children. Workshop sessions included: investigation and prosecution of abusive head trauma and child homicides, interview and interrogation techniques for multidisciplinary team members, youth who sexually offend, adult sex offenders, child pornography, the victimization of children with disabilities and effective communication methods, child sexual abuse prevention, cybercrimes and sex trafficking.

For the first time, Summit attendees were offered the opportunity to explore the power of healing through the first-hand experience of local adult survivors of child sexual abuse. During

a moderated panel discussion, each participant discussed their journeys of healing and provided insights into what helped and hindered them along the way.

Keynote Speaker, Kevin Mulcahy, Assistant U.S. Attorney and Chief of the General Crimes Unit prosecuting child exploitation cases, shared the lessons he learned from his experiences both as a survivor of childhood sexual exploitation and also as a long-term federal prosecutor. Kevin was one of the most powerful speakers we have ever had!

Plenary Speaker, Joseph Rampolla, Captain for the Park Ridge Police Department in New Jersey focusing on cyber-crimes, augmented reality/virtual worlds, cyber-bullying and advanced undercover Internet Relay Chat (IRC) investigations, uncovered the world of emerging technologies that were developed and utilized to commit cybercrimes and victimize children.

"As adults, we have the responsibility of protecting the community's children by educating ourselves to recognize and react responsibly to child sexual and physical abuse. Bivona's Child Abuse Summit not only provides the community the opportunity to become educated on the issue of child abuse but also learn ways to combat the issue. Educated adults are our only weapons to prevent future abuse from occurring," stated Bivona's Executive Director, Mary Whittier.

Champions for Children

Each year, two recipients are selected as Bivona's Champions for Children. The Diane Larter Champion for Children Award is given to a community member and The Team Champion for Children Award is given to a team member nominated by Bivona's entire multidisciplinary team. Both awards are given, at Bivona's Annual Dinner held in September, to those who have dedicated themselves to the mission of Bivona and the children by demonstrating selfless dedication through community support and volunteer activities.

John Harris, Co-Trustee of the Glover-Crask Charitable Trust

The 2015 Diane Larter Champion for Children Award winner is John Harris. John, a native Rochesterian, is the Co-Trustee of the Glover-Crask Charitable Trust and is also a dedicated volunteer.



As Co-Trustee of the Glover-Crask Charitable Trust, John honors the wishes of trustees Mr. and Mrs. Glover to provide financial assistance to local disadvantaged children. Bivona's most immediate needs are often met through a program created and funded by the Glover-Crask Charitable Trust- Bivona's Community Closet. The Community Closet was created to supply children and their families with their most immediate needs such as blankets, clothing, formula, diapers or personal items.

"The children and families served at Bivona come to the agency looking for help and healing. The last thing they need to be worrying about is having their basic needs met. The Glover-Crask Charitable Trust was created with these children and families in mind. The Glovers didn't want children to be without," stated John.

John has dedicated his time to supporting Bivona since the agency was founded. Similarly to the Glovers, he has a passion for helping children and those that provide services to them. His goal has always been to take care of Bivona's Team to avoid burnout and vicarious trauma- often suffered by professionals who work on the front lines of trauma inflicted upon children. John's philosophy on taking care of the caregiver is what drove him to provide Bivona's Team with days of respite or "family days" in which the entire multidisciplinary team of professionals can spend time with each other and bring along their families to create enjoyable memories together.

The benevolence and devotion John continually displays to the children and Bivona's Team is what distinguishes him from others and demonstrates his selfless dedication to supporting our mission.

"It is a pleasure to work with Bivona's Team. I am extremely humbled to be acknowledged to receive such an honor as the Diane Larter Champion for Children Award, given the work that is accomplished each day at Bivona. I am in complete awe of the team and the work they do. Our community is lucky to have this agency as an available resource to restore hope to children," said John.

Wendy Malsegna, Monroe County Deputy Sheriff Investigator

Bivona Child Advocacy Center's Team Champion for Children Award recipient for 2015 is Wendy Malsegna. Wendy is a United States Army Veteran and currently a Monroe County Deputy Sheriff Investigator.

Wendy always knew she wanted to become a law enforcement officer, as she wanted to follow in the footsteps of her father (Vincent Snyder, Retired Senior Investigator of the New York State Police). She began pursuing her career by attending the Police Explorers as a teenager. Wendy joined the Army and then was accepted into the part-time police academy. Upon graduation, Wendy worked for the Brockport Police Department and then joined the Monroe County Sheriff's Office in September 1999. After 11 years of service, Wendy began teaching the D.A.R.E program for the Monroe County Sheriff's Office.

"Teaching D.A.R.E. was such a rewarding job and sparked my interest in working with children," explained Wendy. After teaching D.A.R.E., Wendy was promoted to Deputy Sheriff Investigator in June 2011. With her promotion, she felt as if she lost a meaningful aspect of her role- assisting and interacting with children from the D.A.R.E. programs. When she was introduced to Bivona's multidisciplinary team her interest was sparked once again. Shortly after her promotion, Wendy was asked if she wanted to specialize in investigating cases involving children and without hesitation, she pursued the opportunity.

Today, she works with children conducting investigative interviews, searching for information regarding each case, working towards obtaining a confession utilizing a non-custodial approach and even making the arrest when warranted. Wendy notes, "Child abuse cases are like fingerprints; there are no two cases that are the same."

Wendy's nomination came directly from Bivona's team because of her dedication and compassion for the children of our community. She stops at nothing to provide services to children and has previously utilized her own resources to support the needs of children.

Wendy is honored to have been chosen to receive Bivona's Team Champion for Children Award in recognition of her hard work while with Bivona. She loves to be involved with improving the lives of children and could not

be more grateful for receiving this honor. She explained, "I enjoy what I do. I don't do it for the recognition, but simply to make a difference in the lives of children. I am proud to be a part of Bivona's team of professionals that tirelessly works to bring about healing and justice for children."



Moving In to One Mount Hope Avenue



On Thursday, September 10, 2015, Bivona Child Advocacy Center officially commemorated its grand opening of the Skalny Building at One Mount Hope Avenue- formerly the Old Stone Warehouse.

Thanks to a \$500,000 lead gift by The Joseph and Irene Skalny Charitable Trust, plus 446 private and corporate contributions from the community, Bivona raised more than \$5.3 million dollars in just three years to renovate and relocate to The Skalny Building.

Since the agency's inception in 2004, Bivona has tripled the number of children evaluated, tripled its partnerships, tripled its operating budget and underwent three facility upgrades at its former 275 Lake Avenue location.

Bivona's renovation plan preserved the history of the building under the direction of architecture firm, NH Architecture, general contractor, CP Kelly and Associates, LLC and owner's representatives Carl and Tara Maier.

"Bivona Child Advocacy Center is the only agency in our community to bring a collaboration of professionals specializing in child abuse cases together all under one roof to protect, treat, and prevent child abuse, while counseling child victims and their families, and holding the offenders accountable," stated Bivona's Executive Director, Mary Whittier. "Before Child Advocacy Centers (CACs) existed, children had to describe their stories of abuse over and over again, forcing



them to relive the trauma and being re-victimized by the very system that was supposed to help them. Offering the best care possible to the children and families we serve remains at the core of our mission. A larger facility means more space to expand programs and services while allowing Bivona to continue developing its partnerships to work towards a community where all children are safe and free from abuse."



1822

In 1822, John Gilbert and Myron Holley built the Old Stone Warehouse. Originally measuring 40x100ft, this trapezoid-shaped building played a large role in Rochester, NY's Industrial history.



1824

In 1824 the aqueduct that carried boats on the Erie Canal across the Genesee River was completed. Business started to literally flow to the other side of the river. The warehouse was abandoned shortly after this.

1856-1864

After being abandoned, the warehouse was used for the storage of tile and pottery.



1889

In about 1889, Bartholomay Brewing Company purchased the building from Oothout. This helped to create one of the "most productive times" for the old stone warehouse.

1975

After the warehouse endured a fire in 1975, damaging its interior, the building was yet again abandoned.

2012-Present

In 2012, the building was purchased by the Bivona Child Advocacy Center. The building was again renovated and Bivona moved into the space in 2015.

1823

The plan and shape of the warehouse came from its surrounding canal routes and Erie Canal commercial transporting system. The Stone Warehouse was first used for the storage of freight. As you can see on the map, the warehouse was located at the junction of a feeder and the Erie Canal, which made it an easy place to stop and store materials.



1838-1856

By 1838 William H. Cheney rented the old stone warehouse from its owner Dr. John Elwood, redesigning the interior to accommodate the foundry that would be housed inside. Some of the first stoves and cast iron products were created in this foundry, before it was abandoned in 1856.



1864-1869

It wasn't until 1864 that Samuel Oothout purchased the building and stored mail for about 4 years. He also expanded the building to its "present size" measuring 90x165ft in 1869.



1905-1968

In 1905 the building was purchased by the Rochester Carting Co. At this time the railroad was becoming the most economical use of transportation and the use of the Erie Canal began declining.



1986

In 1986 Ben Kendig bought the building and through a major renovation converted it into office space.

Since 2008, the Brighter Days Foundation has been dedicated to supporting local organizations that provide critical services to benefit children.

Frank York and Kathy Garen of the Brighter Days Foundation, had the unique idea of creating a groundbreaking community-sponsored fundraising event that would celebrate the work of a collaborative of four local organizations that support making brighter futures for Rochester’s children. The participating nonprofit organizations included: Bivona Child Advocacy Center, Daystar, Villa of Hope and Rochester Childfirst Network.

As the theme for the event was, “Many Hands, Together as One,” each of the four benefitting charities worked together with the foundation to obtain sponsorships, auction items and promote attendance. The event included dinner, dancing and live music along with fantastic live and silent auctions.

With more than 140 attendees, the event was a huge success with each agency receiving more than \$30,000.

Child Abuse Prevention Month

Throughout the month of April in observance of National Child Abuse Prevention Month, Bivona and other local community organizations partnered together to shine a light on an issue that's lived too long in the dark: child abuse. Bivona led the effort to raise awareness of the ongoing issues of child abuse and neglect through a number community outreach events and initiatives.

As the color blue symbolizes child abuse awareness, the month began with the illumination of blue lights on local and national landmarks including; Joseph A. Floreano Rochester Riverside Convention Center, Golisano Children's Hospital, Niagara Falls, Park Avenue Business Association, Rochester Regional Health System (all 6 hospitals), Rochester Regional Transit Service, Rochester City Hall, Rochester Rundel Public Library, South Wedge Business Association, St. John Fisher College and Thompson Health. During the month, each partner illuminated blue lights, symbolic of their commitment to end the epidemic of child abuse from our community.

Pinwheels are also the national symbol for child abuse and neglect prevention—the pinwheel is an uplifting reminder of childhood and the bright futures all children deserve. Staff and representatives from the agency's partners and families from across the community of Greater Rochester planted 1,500 blue pinwheels outside Bivona's facility in honor of the number of children evaluated in the previous year through the agency.

In partnership with ABVI Goodwill and the Salvation Army of Rochester, a display exhibit— Healing Soles— was commissioned and travelled throughout the community during the month. The exhibit represented the number of children evaluated each month at Bivona, and featured 125 pairs of well-worn empty children's shoes, emphasizing the agency's tagline of: *trust. healing. justice.*



Social media users were also encouraged to take part in the efforts by changing their profile pictures for the entire month of April with an image of a child's handprint symbolizing the need to stop child abuse. Messaging encouraging child abuse prevention was also shared and distributed. By the end of the month, the community of Rochester was encouraged to take a stand against child abuse by enrolling in Bivona's prevention education course, Darkness to Light (D2L) Stewards of Children. The two-hour training empowers adults to identify the risks and eliminate the potential for child sexual abuse to occur.
